Christopher's Corner...

Most of the central tenets of the Protestant Reformation are still widely taught, understood and appreciated today. Most notably, sola scriptura (Scripture alone), sola fide (faith alone), and sola gratia (grace alone). However, I have found that one very important tenet does not get the airtime that it deserves: the priesthood of all believers. This tenet is grounded primarily in 1 Peter 2:5, which states "like living stones let yourselves be built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ" (emphasis added). context it is clear that Peter calls on all members of the church to be a priest. But what does this mean? This means that we all have direct access to God through Jesus Christ, our Great High Priest (see Hebrews). That we do not need a human mediator to bring our prayers or our spiritual sacrifices to God.

This principle clearly undercut the clericalism that had so enwrapped the Roman Church. It challenged the authority of the ordained priesthood, and denied that an ordained priest had any ontological or metaphysical difference from any parishioner. In other words, the leaders of worship and the congregation in worship were on equal footing, for in the eyes of God we are all the same. All believers are perfectly spiritual equals. There is no caste system. Those ordained to leadership are simply servants acting on behalf of local believers.

Though I have been educated, called and ordained to be a minister, I am not any more important in the life of this congregation as anyone else. Though we ordain deacons and elders, these offices do not put those ordained in a different spiritual class. The offices of the church were given to us simply for the decent and orderly management of our earthly institutions.

The priesthood of all believers means that all who believe have equal rights and also equal responsibility. That all believers can and should be called to all offices of the church regardless of age, sex or race. For "There is no longer Jew or Greek; there is no longer slave or free; there is no longer male and female, for all of you are one in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:28).

We Protestants need to reclaim this central principle that all believers are priests. As Revelation 5:10 states "you (the Lamb) have made them (us) a kingdom and *priests* serving our God" (emphasis and parentheticals added). That's right Jesus has made us all priests in order to serve God!



So I urge you to take hold of your priesthood and claim this identity as your own. This principle is meant to humble those who lead and lift up those that follow. In the eyes of God we are all the same! Your leaders, myself included, will make mistakes because we are just human beings like you. But we are all called to serve with energy, imagination and love with all that is within us. No matter what, all believers have equal access to God. All who the Spirit calls to ordained office should be encouraged to pursue that calling without any other pre-qualification, no matter what! No group or class has any more right to ordination than any other. For we are all priests sharing a common priesthood given to us by our Great High Priest, Jesus Christ. Let us never forget that we are a priesthood of all believers.

BackPack Program: A Letter From Betsy Dickson at the Regional Food Bank -

Well, another school year is drawing to a close. And with it, another successful BackPack year. This year, the Food Bank's 243 BackPack schools distributed 188,900 bags, containing 1.8 million meals for hungry children. This is an incredible achievement that benefitted more than the 6,000 students served by BP each week: we know food from the program is shared amongst household members, broadening its impact.

This year's BackPack Program wasn't without obstacles: supply disruptions restricted variety and inflation increased food costs for families and the Food Bank alike. Unfortunately, BackPack food was not immune to either of these national trends. When we realized that food prices were reaching unprecedented levels, we had to make a choice: cut back on the size of the bags to keep costs low, or maintain the size of the bags and deal with the cost ramifications when the program wrapped. We chose to maintain the size of the bags because we know BackPack is a critical intervention for the families that rely on it.

Please know, our dedicated staff did their absolute best to get you as much variety as possible with available food options. And although costs for BackPack exceeded the \$228/child figure we forecasted in August, it's important to note that the only cost of the BackPack program to our school partners is the cost of the food itself. All operational/administrative costs associated with the program (staff, transportation, etc.) are absorbed by the Food Bank.

Here are the 2022-23 service statistics for BP Scotia (Glen Worden/Glendaal/Middle):

• Total bags distributed: 1893

• Average weekly enrollment: 57

Total pounds of food distributed: 37,874Equivalent meals distributed: 31,562

• Meals distributed throughout the year per child: 550

• Average weight of bags (in pounds): 20.0

We know that these numbers represent more than just food leaving the Food Bank warehouse and getting into the hands of the kids that need it: it's schools making their regular BP pickups, packing bags every week around already-full schedules, breaking down cardboard once the bags are packed, and working with kids to make sure that they get on the bus on Fridays with the food that they need. And you do it all because you know that there are hungry kids in your school, and this program helps fill their weekend food gap. We are so appreciative of the work that you do. We know that this program, and all of the bags distributed, could never happen without your support. Thank you for all that you do!

Here is an overview of BP Scotia (Glen Worden/Glendaal/Middle)'s financial activity for 2022-23:

• Total BackPack 2022-23 cost: \$21,865.64

• Funds remaining on account: \$ 0.00

• End of year shortfall: \$786.91

As reflected above, your BackPack account at the Food Bank is depleted. We recognize that food cost inflation is largely to blame for this circumstance as the vast majority of our BackPack sites are diligent fundraisers and sustain their program year-in and year-out. Our hope is that you have internal funds to cover this shortfall.

We will be reassessing the food costs of BackPack 2023-24 this summer, and when we have updated forecasts, will be sure to get them out to all partners so you can plan accordingly. On behalf of Sara and our entire team, please know how much the Food Bank appreciates you, your BackPack crew, and your collective hard work. We are grateful for your partnership and look forward to partnering with you in 2023-24.

Health & Wellness Note: It's summertime and chances are you have already purchased sunscreen, which is just one of the ways to provide skin protection and prevent skin cancer. So with all the choices, you might wonder what is the best sunscreen to use? The Skin Cancer Foundation believes that the best sunscreen is the one you are most likely to use! Just be sure it provides safe and effective protection, and is broad spectrum with a SPF of 15 or higher. With the exception of babies under six months, who should NOT have sunscreen applied, everyone should use sunscreen every day. Infants should stay out of the sun, stay in the shade, and wear sun-protective clothing.

Here's the 5 W's and 1 H from The Skin Cancer Foundation to help you remember:

WHO Should Wear: Everyone under the sun, including those who tan easily.

WHAT Sunscreen to Use: Indoors? Use a broad spectrum SPF 15 or higher; Outdoors? The

SPF should be 30 or higher.

WHEN: Every day; 30 minutes prior to going outdoors. Reapply every two hours.

WHERE: All exposed skin

HOW: One ounce (shot glass full) to the entire body for each application.

WHY: Reduce your risk of skin damage and skin cancer! Remember you skin is damaged

by sun exposure over your lifetime, whether or not you burn.

<u>How does this benefit our community?</u> A 24 hr option for clothing recycling, keeps clothing out of the landfill. (an EPA study says that 85% of clothing in the U.S. is ultimately thrown away instead of donated).

<u>How does this benefit our church?</u> St. Pauly Textiles pays us 4ϕ per pound, keeps the overflow of clothes (more than we can handle) out of the green shed.

Community Meal: In our small community we don't have a Thanksgiving meal that is made in Scotia. We have many churches that do much for our community, but we don't have a thanksgiving meal here. The Salvation Army and Equinox will deliver to the area, although we should have a meal that is exclusive to Scotia-Glenville. This meal would foster community by having our church work with the fire department to provide for our own.

The meal will consist of turkey, dressing, gravy, green beans, sweet potatoes, rolls. I will be asking any of our members who would like to donate pies (apple or pumpkin) so each meal will have a pie. We are looking to have 100 pies. The meal will be cooked Tuesday the 21 of November and will be packaged up and sent out on the 22.

The delivery of these meals will take place at 11:00 am on Wednesday November 22. The fire departments of Alplaus, Beukendual and Thomas Corners will be helping with the delivery of the meals. (*Thanks to Richard Doyle, Wayne Penn and Walt and Walter Pfunter for their support of this endeavor.*)

Sign up for these meals will be taking place at the September and October Community lunch. If any of our members are interested in having a meal please come to those meals to sign up. I would like to thank the consistory for their approval. The meal is capped at 100 meals.

At the end of May we will have surpassed 4,000 meals given out, with the grab and go meal on June fourteenth we hit 4,089 meals so far.

I would like to thank the volunteers who always show compassion and caring for our guests, plus the kind words they included in the June newsletter. I couldn't do this without them. I would like to thank the Missions crew for their support over the past 4 years. Linda has led this group for many years now and she is absolutely wonderful to work with. Lastly, the staff of our church are fantastic. Kristen, Paul and Vicky have been instrumental in helping us with the Community meal.

A side note of thanks to Spike, Bill, and Mark for helping clean the attic. You guys have been so helpful and willing to finish that project.
