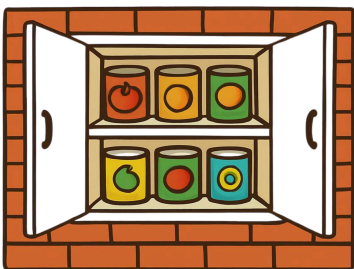

Doug has a large cooler filled with ice and 2 cases of water that disappears incredibly quickly! So, please consider donating **water** to our mission throughout the summer.

Also needed are men's tee shirts in sizes L, XL, and XXL. Summer socks are always welcomed.

We include a stop at a motel in Schenectady that houses primarily families while they await apartments. These children need summer activities such as frisbees, bubbles, coloring books, and sidewalk chalk. Books are always a favorite for a variety of ages.

Health and Wellness Note

It's July and it probably seems like summer vacation has just begun. But it probably won't be long before you hear, "I'm bored, there's nothing to do". (The official definition of boredom is "the state of being weary and restless through lack of interest." It may be a surprise to learn that boredom is generally considered to be a self-inflicted problem.)

Then as the summer goes on all the anticipation of fun fades away and children miss their school friends. The American Psychological Association lists finding little pleasure in life and losing interest in hobbies, is one of the signs of depression. Parents should be aware that extended periods of this stress and boredom can indicate that depression is setting in and take action. According to Beverly Beuermann-King, a Canadian mental health speaker, wrote, "The antidote to stress and boredom is curiosity. Curiosity happens when you start to explore the world." Below are some tips for children to combat stress and boredom. Some may even work for adults when they're bored or stressed.

- **Make up a new sport or game.** When your children have created new games or new rules for an old game, time flies by. So balloon volleyball anyone? You don't need a whole team to play!
- **Have a picnic.** If able, have the children make their own lunch and try to come up with different food combinations or maybe breakfast for dinner. Then walk out to your yard or another outdoor spot, if available. Raining? Take lunch to a friend or family member.
- **Find activities that challenge them.** Look for scavenger hunts, themed walks, paper airplanes or projects for them to do. Pinterest has activities for all age groups.
- **Plan a camp-out in the backyard.** Set up a tent or sleep under the stars. If allowed, roast marshmallows and have them learn how to make a campfire.
- **Learn about another country.** On a rainy day, research a country. Learn about their customs and foods and then make a recipe together.
- **Write a play for the neighborhood.** Scenery and costumes can also be included.
- **Create a list of chores for them to do.** You might be amazed how quickly they find something else to do.

Summer comes just once a year. Let the boredom and fun begin.

2026 General Synod Recap

Dear Siblings in Christ of the First Reformed Church of Scotia,

The Reformed Church in America's (www.rca.org) 219th General Synod met in June in Nashville, TN to do the work of the church. Delegates from RCA congregations the world over convened with equity based hospitality as a guide as well as a desire to live into the vision of Revelation 7:9, and heard reports from the RCA's Ethnic Councils (www.rca.org/about/government/general-synod/racial-ethnic-councils/), including the Native American Indigenous Ministries Council, the African-American Black Council, The Pacific and Asian American Ministries Council, The Hispanic Ministries Council, our partners in Mission (www.rca.org/global-mission/), as well as various General Synod Commissions. The General Synod Commissions (<https://www.rca.org/about/government/general-synod/commissions/>) include the following groups: Christian Action, Christian Discipleship and Education, Christian Unity, Christian Worship, Church Order, History, Judicial Business, Nominations, Race and Ethnicity, Theology, and Women. Together the delegates of the RCA's General Synod 2026, made moving and powerful statements denouncing Christian Nationalism as a doctrine, supporting the right and proper treatment of immigrants and refugees, validating our rich history and practice of women in leadership as Ministers of Word and Sacrament as well as Elders and Deacons, and much more. 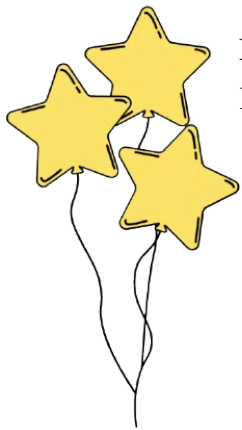
